#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Our Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students have just completed their 2019 NAPLAN on line tests. NAPLAN allows us to identify the areas in which students are doing well and areas where they need additional assistance with their learning. It is pleasing that Coolamon Central School has



been identified by the Department of Education as one of the schools within the Rural South and West that has high value added results for both years 3-5 and years 5-7 over the last two years (2017-18).

Our Middle School team, headed by Mr Celi and Mrs Shergold, have been analysing student results and performance over the last two years. Notes will be sent to parents this week for students who have been identified as our first enrichment groups. This is a marvellous opportunity for your child to be extended in their literacy and numeracy.

I would like to invite all parents to our 7-11 Parent Teacher evening on Tuesday 21st May. Our K-6 Parent Teacher evening is held next Tuesday 28th May. This is a fantastic opportunity for you to come and discuss your children's progress with their teachers. I look forward to chatting to parents if you would like to see me.

I would urge parents to consider immunising their children against influenza. The flu season has started early this year and is likely to peak in June. The school has organised for the majority of its staff to be vaccinated at Coolamon Pharmacy this week.

The AMA NSW president Dr Seng-Lim has said, "Influenza is more likely to be passed on in enclosed environments, that's one reason why schools can be a problem, you have a large number of children sitting together for a long period of time".

### Whole School Athletics Carnival

On Monday 6<sup>th</sup> May 2019 Coolamon Central School students participated in our annual Athletics Carnival. The weather on the day was brilliant and staff and students alike couldn't have asked for a better day. This was a welcome sight, after the awful weather that the previous Friday presented!

Primary students began the day running their hearts out with some fierce competition within the age groups. A particular highlight was the mighty infant sprint races, which brought back memories of the great runners of our generation, including Carl Lewis, Michael Johnson, Wilma Rudolf and Gail Devers. Mr Dennis Hewson our woodwork teacher, 'bluey king' and closet sprint enthusiast remarked "I have never seen, in my time as a teacher at CCS, a group of infants students as fast as this. I had to dust off the glasses after they ran past". Mrs White, who was quite the 200m specialist, confirmed that the primary runners may have even given her a run for her money. "They are very good, and with training, they may even get close to my time" she stated. Who knows, we may have a crop of superstars on our hands!

Meanwhile Secondary started their day with the field events and it was a wonderful sight to see so many competitors vying for house points. Mrs Corbett, who from all reports was a much better Triple/Long jumper at school than her husband Andrew, was noticed high fiving, screaming and cheering on the participants as they jumped their way in to CCS sporting history. Mr Lyons who was on high jump, was spotted several times checking student's shoes for springs, 'flubber' material or Michael Jordan, due to the heights reached in this event. "At one point, I thought I was going to have to hold the bar over my own head" he said as the 17+ boys rolled around and cleared another height.

Mr Besgrove, PDHPE teacher and all round nice guy proclaimed "I'm so proud of Secondary, I've never seen so many competitors having a dig. This is what it's all about!" This was seconded by Mr Thomas Pollard, who confirmed that not only was he proud, but mathematically, statically, algebraically, and by squaring to the root of an integer on a bar graph with a box and whisker plot, it was the most participation he has ever seen. This was supported by Mrs Taber and Ms Barker in Primary who decided that not only had primary consistently dominated the participation rates in all carnivals, but that primary students had in fact already shown that they will carry this participation on into secondary. "We are simply the best, I just wish the Broncos and Queensland were as good as primary" Mrs Taber remarked. "I agree, however, primary are performing more like NSW at the moment" said Ms Barker.

Primary always have high volumes of competitors but in Secondary, we believe the rise in more students participating is due to our new points scoring system, where first place receives eight points, second place; six points, third place; four points, a competitor receives two points and our participators receive one point. More points up for grabs means more competitors on the track and field.

The day finished with some nail biting 100m sprints from Secondary and some amazing distances and heights thrown or jumped in Primary. We unfortunately didn't finish the carnival on the day, however, on Thursday we were able to complete our relays and announce the winner!

RANNOCK was victorious overall followed by Millwood and Methul.

Thank you to all community members, parents, staff, Mrs Crocker's food tech class and most importantly the students. Thank you for making the day outstanding, competitive and overall fabulous.



#### WHICH CONTAINERS CAN BE REFUNDED?

#### Eligible containers

Most 150ml to 3000ml (3L) drink containers can be exchanged for a 10c refund or donation to Vinnies. Container materials that may be eligible for a refund include:



- Glass
- Plastic
- Aluminium
- Steel
- Liquid paperboard (cartons)

Containers must be empty, uncrushed, unbroken and have the original label attached.

#### Non-eligible containers

Containers that cannot be returne for a refund or donation include:

- Plain milk (or milk substitute) containers
- Flavoured milk containers of one litre or more
- Pure fruit or vegetable juice containers of one litre or mo
- · Glass containers for wine and spirits
- Casks (plastic bladders in boxes) for wine or water of one litre or more
- Sachets for wine of 250ml or more
- Containers for cordials and concentrated fruit/vegetable juices

If a container isn't eligible for a refund, please use a recycling bin

Our School is now collecting 'single-use-drink containers' as a fundraiser. We have partnered with St Vincent de Paul's new Bulk Container Deposit Depot in Wagga Wagga to recycle and reclaim the 10c 'Return and Earn' refund. This Depot can process up to 1000 containers an hour and give instant refunds. Vinnies will provide blue Otto bins to our school and a regular pick up service. Refunds will be split 50/50 with St Vencent de Paul. A full 240 litre Otto bin makes a profit of about \$25 for our school. Parents and community members are now invited to contribute to this fundraiser by bringing their single-use-drink-containers to the blue bins. 
