HSC Minimum Standards tests.

All Yr 10 and some students in Yr 11 will need to complete these tests in order to be eligible for a HSC. We will be holding the tests on Wednesday the 26th June. Students will get more information and formal notification of the tests they need to attempt.



1/ SENTRAL - Parent Portal

Thank you to all the parents who have successfully accessed the parent portal. If you are experiencing difficulty please contact the office. You can see your child's attendance, explain absences and more functions will come on line soon.

2/ Mobile Phones:

Primary - No primary student is to have a mobile phone at school (This is a NSW Government initiative)

Secondary - If a secondary student needs to have a mobile phone at school our rule is simple - "Mobile phones should not interrupt learning". Our expectation is they should only be used at recess or lunch unless the teacher has specifically allowed use as part of learning(EG: Taking pictures of a project). Students who uses their phone irresponsibly will be dealt with under our school wellbeing and discipline procedures. Repeat offenders may have their phone confiscated and parent will be asked to collect it.

3/ Uniform:

Full school uniform is expected every day. The exception being sport uniform when it is required.

Any student out of uniform should have a note to explain the circumstances.

SCHOOL CONTRIBUTIONS AND ELECTIVE FEES

While the course fee for your child's scholastic year is voluntary, elective fees are **compulsory** and are used to buy consumables for these subjects. If you are experiencing difficulty paying your elective fees please contact the school.

Payment options include cash, cheque or Eftpos via the front office or via the \$ Make a Payment tab on the school website. Please pay your contributions **as soon as possible** to allow the school to continue with important educational programs in 2019.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

You need **reading, writing and maths skills for everyday life** after school. This is why you are required to demonstrate a **minimum standard of literacy and numeracy** to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.



To make sure you have the basics right, and show you meet the minimum standard, you need to pass short online tests of everyday reading, writing and maths skills.



The tests will be available to take at school up to twice a year in Year 10, Year 11 or Year 12, and even after the HSC.



Sample questions and answers are available online, as well as practice tests and advice from students who have completed the tests.



Your school will help you decide when you are ready to take each test.



You do not need to sit the reading, writing or numeracy online test(s) if you achieved Band 8 or above in the respective 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN test(s).

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Some students with disabilities will be eligible for extra provisions for the online tests, or an exemption. Talk to your teachers to determine whether you are eligible for provisions. A Disability Provisions, Exemptions and Appeals policy is available on the NESA website.

Garnet & Emerald

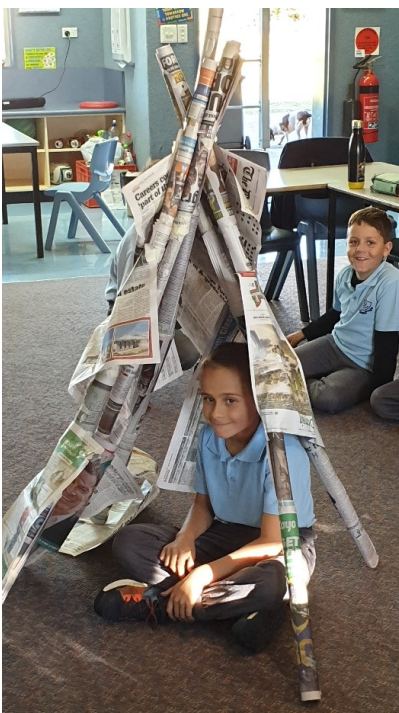

Primary Excursion Payment Plans

JUST A LITTLE *Reminder*

As you are aware Stage 2 will be going to Beechworth & Stage 3 will be going to Ballarat/Bendigo on their excursions in Term 4. We know that families can become inundated with financial obligations throughout the year. For this reason we recommend that you follow the suggested payment plans below and make small, regular contributions, to ensure that your child does not miss out on attending the excursion. Alternatively you may pay the entire amount in full.

Stage 2 have **2 overdue payments of \$10 each which were due on 17th and 31st May**. Future payments of \$10 are due on the following dates: 14th June, 28th June, 26th July, 9th August and 23rd August.

Stage 3 have **2 overdue payments of \$40 & \$25 which were due on 17th and 31st May**. Future payments of \$25 are due on the following dates: 14th June, 28th June, 26th July, 9th August, 23rd August and one payment of \$30 due 6th September.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.





My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

- Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

- Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a *Compulsory Schooling Order*. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

- Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to [complete their schooling](#).

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.

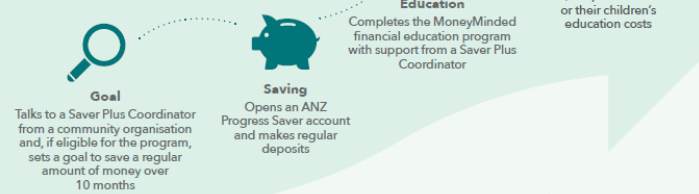
