

Remembrance Day



On Friday 9th November Coolamon Central School held a whole school assembly in recognition of the sacrifices made by those who fought in World War I. We were joined by members of the Australian Defence Force in the form of an official catafalque party and bugler. It was a truly inspiring moment to see our students stand and reflect on what it means to be a democratic nation and in remembering those who fought for the rights and privileges we have today.

A further highlight was listening to our 2019 School Captains and their address to the school and wider community on why it is important to continue to recognise this day and its value for youth. It was also a privilege to watch these same leaders and other

students attend the town ceremony on the 11th November. Below is an excerpt from the leader's speech; "As we stand here today, at Coolamon Central School remembering those who fought for our freedom take time and pause to consider what the true meaning of this significant part of our national identity actually is.

Remembrance Day in Australia commemorates the noble sacrifices of armed forces and civilians during times of war. At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, one minute of silence is observed across the country to mark the cessation of hostilities on the Western front during WW1 after over four years of gruesome warfare.

Unlike ANZAC Day, Remembrance Day is not a public holiday in Australia but services are held at 11am at War Memorials and cenotaphs in suburbs and towns across the country. It is observed across the world in the United Kingdom, Canada, France, South Africa, The United States of America, Bermuda, Ireland and New Zealand.

As the youth of Australia, the future of this nation, it is not only our birthright to hear and learn of the legacy of those Australians who engaged in conflict for our peace and sovereignty, but to ensure that we continue to recognise, value and remember those who served. That we live by the values that enriched our forefathers and foremothers, and seek to achieve peace" (2019 School Captains)

Ready for high school checklist

Tick each item when it has been done (not all tasks will apply to you).

This year

- Does your teen have allergies, a health condition or additional needs? If so, talk to the high school principal as soon as possible.
- Encourage your teen to participate in any transition to high school program offered to them.
- Watch videos about high school at education.nsw.gov.au/high-school

At high school orientation

- Find out about school uniforms (including sports uniforms) - where
- Get a map of the school to identify buildings entry points and bike racks
- Note school start and finish times.
- Discuss safe travel routes to and from school, and find out about forms for your teen's travel pass or subsidy if applicable.
- Get details on programs the school offers.
- Make a list of book packs and school supplies.
- Learn how you can become involved in the school.
- Meet the Year 7 advise
- Connect with other parents of Facebook and Twitter.



Next year

January

- Buy school uniforms, books, stationery, school bag, drink bottle, house key, and any other supplies.
- Label everything.
- Break in school shoes to make them more comfortable.
- Practise travelling to and from school with your teen using their new transport or travel route. Let your teen buy travel tickets, if applicable.
- Teach them how to read the timetable for the bus, train or ferry as appropriate.
- Join your school and the department on social media to get all the updates.

At home

- Talk positively to your teen about the move to high school.
- Ask them what's exciting about high school. Does anything worry them?
- Make sure your teen has a quiet work area and extra stationery supplies.
- Organise personal hygiene items in school bags.
 Decide what your teen will do before and after.
- school, and what time they need to be home.

 Discuss emergency and safety issues with them.

The first day

- Help set your teen's alarm. Encourage them to get themselves ready on time.
- Provide your teen with money and your contact numbers in case of emergencies.
- Make sure you have the school's phone number with you.

The first wee

- Photocopy school timetables to place in school diaries, inside locker doors and on the fridge.
- Remind your teen to note all assignments, homework and events in their diary.
- Check through the timetable each night while your teen packs their bag. Encourage your teen to eat healthy food and get a good night's sleep.
- Give the school your current contact details.

Got It! Program

Getting On Track In Time

Got It! is a unique and exciting early intervention program rolling out in Years K - 2, in primary schools across NSW as a partnership between NSW Heath and Education. The aim of the program is to support and develop children's social and emotional skills, behaviour and well-being. **Got It!** is made up of two programs run through the school, *Fun FRIENDS* and *Exploring Together*.

Fun FRIENDS is a social and emotional learning program that all K – 2 students will take part in. This will be delivered in the classroom by teachers that have received the Fun FRIENDS training, and is made up of a whole lot of fun activities like drawing, yoga, puppet play, story-telling and group games.

Some parents will have opportunity to participate in the more targeted *Exploring Together* program. This program is made up of 10 sessions over 10 weeks where children, parents, teachers and clinicians work together to address any developing emotional and behavioural problems. This part of the **Got It!** program will be implemented by the Murrumbidgee Local Health District **Got It!** Team.

In the coming weeks, parents and carers of 2019 Year 1-2 students will receive a survey called the *Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ)*. Please read the information that comes with it, and if you decide to take part please fill out and return your survey through the school by Monday 10 December 2018. The **Got It!** Team will consider the results and contact you if they'd like to chat further.

If you have a child starting Kindergarten in 2019, we will be in touch early next year with surveys for those new students once they have settled in.

We look forward to working with you in 2019!

CYBERBULLYING

Follow us



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Cyberbullying is the repeated use of the internet, mobile phones and other technologies to bully, intimidate and humiliate others. It differs from other bullying because it often continues outside of school and school hours. It can be 24/7 and sometimes you may not know who is behind it.

What does cyberbullying look like?

Cyberbullying might occur over the internet, in instant messaging (IM), social networking sites, blogs or through online gaming. It can also occur over the phone, by SMS or MMS, or voice and video calls.

Why do people cyberbully?

There are a number of reasons why people might cyberbully others, including:

- think it's amusing
- don't like the person
- don't consider it to be a big deal, "it's just words"
- · don't believe there are any consequences
- · think they can be anonymous

None of these reasons, or any others, can justify

What are the effects of cyberbullying?

Things that happen on the internet or mobile phones can have offline consequences. Some of the effects of cyberbullying are:

- anger
- embarrassment
- fear
- poor performance at school
- loss of confidence and self-esteem
- revenge cyberbullying or retaliation
- self-harm, even suicide

Cyberbullying hurts people. It can ruin lives. There

What can you do about cyberbullying?

Don't start it! Cyberbullying is never acceptable. Think before you post something mean, or send someone a hurtful message.

Don't be a part of it! As a bystander, you can do something to stop cyberbullying. If someone tries to get you involved in cyberbullying, say NO.

Don't let it get out of control! You need to tell someone if you are being cyberbullied so that they can help you to make it stop.

How can you stay in control?

- learn how to block cyberbullying communications
- find out your school's policy on cyberbullying
- research what policies your Internet Service Provider (ISP) and any online sites and applications you are using have on cyberbullying
- tell someone!

How can you help your friends?

- encourage them to speak to a trusted adult if they are being cyberbullied
- don't forward or pass on any cyberbullying materials such as links to humiliating videos or gossip texts
- create a positive culture in your school and community which doesn't tolerate bullying in any form


Lego Club
