

Safety at School: Bullying

Safety at School: Bullying

Misunderstandings and arguments are pretty common in the playground. Kids are still developing social skills and learning how to communicate with others.

Not every incident or disagreement that upsets a student can be defined as bullying – sometimes it's a one-off problem or a genuine misunderstanding.

Bullying is different. Bullying is a deliberate and repeated abuse of power of one student over another. It can be verbal, physical or psychological abuse that is intended to cause harm. Lately, there has also been a lot of talk about cyberbullying.

This happens through communication technology like email, social networking sites such as MSN, Facebook and of course mobile phones.

This kind of harassment can be spread very quickly, not just to a child's own friends, but way beyond the school community to complete strangers.

It can be devastating and needs to be taken as seriously as any other form of bullying.

Bullying is not a problem isolated to school yards. It can happen anywhere that kids socialise, including online.

It's a community issue, which is why parents have such an important role to play in resolving this kind of negative and very damaging behaviour.

Unfortunately, parents often don't hear about their child's problems until the issue has really escalated and their child has been repeatedly harassed and hurt.

If your child is not one to talk openly – and many teenagers have trouble expressing themselves in this way – some of the signs that may indicate there is a problem are:

- Sudden physical pain like stomach aches or head aches that keep them from school
- Finding it difficult to get out of bed or not wanting to go to school at all
- A change in their demeanour. Are they more withdrawn than usual? Do they look stressed or really miserable?
- Are they much angrier than normal? Is your child having trouble containing his emotions? Or perhaps you've noticed a sudden decline in academic performance?

I think the best advice I can give is trust your instincts. You know your child best. If you feel that there's been a change in your child that lasts for more than a week make sure you follow it up.

Crossroads - Rotary Driver Simulator

Crossroads is a mandatory program for students in Years 11 and/or 12 in NSW government schools. Crossroads is designed to help senior students address issues of health, safety and wellbeing at a time when they face significant changes and challenges in their lives. Crossroads aims to prepare and support these students as they encounter situations related to identity, independence and their changing responsibilities. The Rotary Club of Coolamon are fully funding a day where students in Years 11 and 12 will engage in simulated driving



exercises. We thank the Rotary Club and students should expect a letter about this soon.

PROJECT ROCKIT has been empowering school students to stand up to hate instead of standing by watching. Through the lens of (cyber) bullying, the workshops explore themes of diversity, belonging, respectful relationships, values and ethics, while building student voice, leadership and empathy.

Coolamon Central School has been selected to receive a day of cyberbullying workshops for your students to build their digital citizenship skills. The workshops are funded by Telstra and delivered by PROJECT ROCK IT – Telstra Foundation Digital Futures partner.

These workshops are important because:

• Bullying remains a huge issue affecting young Australians: almost one-third of young people report being bullied every few weeks.

• The rapid growth in technology and social media means that bullying occurs around the clock and is often suffered in silence.

• Experiences of school bullying have been linked with increased risks of suicidal thoughts, poorer physical health and early school

The Validation of Assessment for Learning and Individual Development (VALID) for year 10 will be held on Friday 14th September 2018.

This is an online Science assessment that will be testing students:

- Knowledge and understanding
- Understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- Ability to evaluate evidence, make judgments and think critically
- Ability to access information and communicate scientific ideaes

Students will need to bring working earbuds or headphones on the day.

If you have any concerns regarding your child participating in the VALID exam or if they need any special considerations please contact the school and we can discuss your child's needs.

Results will be available in Term 4 2018. Information about your child's results are treated confidentially and held securely to ensure student privacy. A report on your child's results will be sent to parents and carers.

A reminder to parents to notify the school about your child's health

We welcome information from parents about your child's health, even if you are not requesting specific support from our school. Our school asks for medical information when you enrol your child. It is also important that you let us know if your child's health care needs change or if a new health condition develops.

Information about allergies, medical conditions such as asthma and diabetes and other health care related issues (including prior conditions such as medical procedures in the last 12 months) should be provided to the school by parents. Please provide this information in writing to the principal. This will greatly assist our school in planning to support your child's health and wellbeing.

Please also remember to notify staff in the school office of any changes to your contact details or to the contact details of other people nominated as emergency contacts.

We appreciate your assistance in this regard and assure you that any information you provide the school will be stored securely and will only be used or disclosed in order to support your son or daughter's health needs or as otherwise required by law.

ANAPHYLAXIS PREVENTION

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sometimes sudden allergic reaction. It can occur when a susceptible person is exposed to an allergen, such as food or insect stings. Reactions usually begin within minutes of exposure and can progress rapidly over a period of up to two hours or more. **Anaphylaxis is potentially life threatening and always requires an emergency response**.

In order to support students at risk of anaphylaxis, we aim to ensure every reasonable effort is made to minimise their exposure to known allergens within the school environment and during school related activities. To further support this, we ask that parents refrain from sending peanuts and all tree nuts to school with their children. This includes peanut butter sandwiches.

Please do not hesitate to contact the school office should you wish to clarify details regarding anaphylaxis and our strategies to minimise its risks. Anaphylaxis is a serious concern, and we thank you in advance for your co-operation.

Head Lice

Head Lice infestations occur form time to time in our school.

Effective treatment is essential to break the cycle. To help us try to control head lice, please check your child's hair regularly and treat appropriately, if symptoms occur use the methods recommended in information from the NSW Department of Health.

- Always tie back long hair.
- Keep a fine tooth head lice comb in the bathroom and encourage all family members to use it when they wash their hair.
- Head lice move from one person's head to another via hair.
- Head lice do not survive long when they are off a human head.
- Daily combing of hair with white hair conditioner using a fine tooth comb is effective in getting rid of head lice and eggs.
